organisation, the Irish Ropalitiens Brothlerhoot, and through her open military organisations, the Irish Volunteers and the Irish Citten Army, having patiently perfected her discipline, having resolutely-waited for the right moment to reveal itself, she now selects that moment, and, supported by her existle children in America and by gallant allies in Europe, but relying in the first on her own strength, she We declare the right of the sponse of braids and two ownership of Friends, and to

the unfettered control of frish destinies, to be sovereign and indefeasible. The long unrepation of that right by a foreign people and government has not excitinguished the right, nor can a cyer be extinguished except by the destruction of the frish people. State, and we polege our lives and the lives of our comrades-in-arms to the cause of its freedom, of its welfare, and of its exultance among the nations.

The Irish Republic is entitled to and hereby claims, the allegiance of every lirishman and Irishwoman. The Republic guarantees religious and ceil liberty, equal rights and equal opportunities to all its citizens, and declares its resolve to pursue the happiness and prosperity of the whole nation and of all its parts, cherishing all the children of the nation equally, and oblirious of the differences carefully fostered by an allen government, which have divided an innority from the majority in the past.

Until our arms have brought the opportune moment for the establishment of a permanent National Government, representative of the whole people of Iroland and elected by the suffrages of all her men and women, the Provisional Government, hereby constituted, will administer the civil and military affairs of the Ropublic in trust for

the people.

We place the cause of the Irish Bepublic under the protection of the Most High God. Whose blessing we invoke upon our arms, and we pray that no one who serves that cause will dishonour it by cowardien inhumanity, or rapine. In this supreme bour the Irish nation must, by its valours and discipline and by the readiness of its children to sacrifice themselves for the common good, prove itself worthyof the august destiny to which it is called.
